## **The Department of Homeland Security's Procurement of Ammunition and Firearms**

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and its Components utilize a variety of types and calibers of ammunition in fulfillment of law enforcement and military missions. The Department employs more law enforcement agents than any other Department in the Federal Government and has employees stationed across the country. Many of the men and women of DHS put their lives at risk protecting the Nation every day and therefore, must carry firearms in the line of duty. As such, DHS requires that employees who carry firearms in the line of duty regularly undergo qualification and training on any weapon issued to them. The Department uses ammunition in its operations, training, and qualifications programs commensurate with its missions. Over the past ten years, the Department has continued to leverage the size of its law enforcement and security operations to save taxpayer funds through strategic sourcing contracts and efficient business processes for the procurement of ammunition and other law enforcement related items and services.

The most commonly used types of ammunition include .40 S&W caliber, .223 Remington caliber, 9MM, .357 SIG caliber, .38 caliber, 7.62MM, .50 caliber, and 12ga shotgun ammunition. Components use other types and calibers of rounds in much smaller quantities. While certain Components may purchase dedicated training ammunition, DHS Components generally use hollow-point duty rounds for routine requalification and training situations. Hollow-point bullets expand on impact and limit collateral damage. Accordingly, the Department generally uses hollow-point duty ammunition in service-issued pistols. Most of the .40 S&W caliber, 9MM, .357 SIG caliber, and .38 caliber ammunition referenced in the attached spreadsheets contain hollow-point bullets. Some of the ammunition procured in those calibers by TSA, FLETC, and USSS is lead-free, frangible ammunition used only for training. These types of rounds do not contain hollow-point bullets. To promote increased safety and efficiency, the Department is exploring whether industry can produce a round that would be 1) readily identifiable as a training round to avoid the possibility of confusing the rounds, and 2) potentially offered at significant discount to the price currently paid for duty ammunition.

Currently, the logistics of storing and issuing distinct training and duty rounds to officers can be challenging and costly to administer. However, the duty rounds DHS procures through strategic sourcing contracts come at a significant savings to the government. As of April 15, 2013, the Department possessed an inventory of approximately 246,451,611 rounds. Due to the fact that manufacturers can take from six months to a year to deliver ammunition, DHS has roughly a two-year supply of ammunition on hand at a given time in order to manage training and operational posture needs. Ammunition supplies are generally managed at Component field offices and training sites by ammunition coordinators or firearms instructors, and inventory records are subject to review by internal oversight offices during both routine and unannounced audits.

Only TSA, USSS, and USCG reported lost, stolen, or unaccounted-for ammunition in the last three fiscal years:

As the executive agent for most DHS strategic source ammunition contracts, ICE has reported ammunition shortages on several occasions. Beginning in fiscal year (FY) 2008, quality issues affecting several lots of ammunition resulted in ICE recalling significant quantities of ammunition from the field. Following the recalls, DHS suppliers were unable to produce ammunition in quantities necessary to replace the recalled lots and satisfy continuing demand. Although DHS was able to address immediate shortages by redistributing ammunition lots not affected by the recall, the need to maintain a larger inventory became apparent. The Department believes current inventory levels are adequate to protect against future supply disruptions. DHS will continue to be transparent about its procurement activities. While DHS spending on ammunition represents less than one tenth of one percent of the DHS budget, we continue to pursue measures that leverage all of the Department’s resources in order to make best use of taxpayer dollars. The Department utilizes a variety of firearms in fulfillment of law enforcement and military missions, including pistols, rifles, shotguns, submachine guns, and a smaller number of other firearms such as gas canister launchers and machine guns. The chart below shows the amount of money currently budgeted for firearms acquisition in FY2013:

*\*Some of the funds listed as budgeted for FY13 have already been expended, notably by FPS. FPS is transitioning pistols for their entire force during FY13.*

*\*FLETC firearms are funded as a part of the overall training equipment budget. The information above represents average spending on firearms for the past five years. The purchases are based on weapons' lifecycle. Additionally, weapons are donated from agencies that change models and provide FLETC with their remaining serviceable weapons.*

Like ammunition, firearms inventories are managed carefully by the Department. Recognizing the importance of firearms accountability, DHS has made efforts in recent years to lower the number of unaccounted firearms. In addition to renewed focus on inspections and other policy changes, the DHS Weapons and Ammunition Commodity Council conducted a strategically sourced procurement available to all Components for vehicle lockboxes in order to better secure weapons and ammunition. The chart below shows the number of firearms lost, stolen, or unaccounted for during each of the last three fiscal years.

DHS firearms are generally utilized until they are no longer serviceable, at which point they are destroyed. ICE's National Firearms and Tactical Training Unit destroys obsolete or unserviceable firearms at commercial foundries, where the firearms are melted and the metal is recycled for other uses. Other Components also use commercial vendors to melt down firearms using multiple government witnesses to ensure destruction. In addition, USCG destroys some unserviceable weapons or transfers them to the Defense Logistics Agency for destruction. When firearms are destroyed, DHS records the destruction on both hard and electronic inventory records. In some cases, functioning firearms that are considered excess are transferred to other federal agencies with firearms authorization for use. For example, FLETC often accepts functioning firearms and usable ammunition that are determined by the donating agency to be no longer suitable for duty use for use in FLETC student training.
