Dear Representative's Roskam and Carney, Senator's Carper and Coburn:

On behalf of the American Association of Orthopaedic Surgeons (AAOS), I would like to thank you for introducing the Preventing and Recovering Improper Medicare Expenditures (PRIME) Act. The bill seeks to reduce improper Medicare payments and improve data sharing and has the potential to save taxpayers billions of dollars. The AAOS, which represents over 18,000 board-certified orthopaedic surgeons, is committed fighting waste and fraud in our federal health care system.

Fraud analysts and law enforcement officials estimate between 3% and 10% of health care expenditures are lost annually to fraud. In addition, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services estimated that there was nearly \$48 billion in improper payments for Medicare and \$22.5 billion in improper payments in Medicaid (federal share) in FY 2010.
